Hold tight! Bus review moot

Surbiton's bus network needs a rethink to best serve demand in 2018, says Lib Dem leader Cllr Liz Green as her party squares up to the Tories in next month's local elections.

She wants a review of the K1, K2, K3, K4 and K5 routes, many of which haven't been altered in 30 years.

"All we ever seem to do is tinker," she told a meeting in Glenmore House when the topic was raised. "When routes were put in, people's habits were different. There have been major developments since, and people's shopping habits have changed."

She wants Transport for London to look afresh. "I want to make more of the existing routes; I live on the K2, which is brilliant, but is it fair the K4 is half-hourly, and not on Sundays?' She added that no single bus linked

Tolworth and Kingston hospitals. The Conservatives also seek improvements. Cllr Phil Doyle said: "Routes should be kept under review

to ensure everyone is served by the excellent bus service in London? His colleague Cllr Chris Hayes backs efforts by Sunray estate residents

to revamp the K1 service - largely unaltered since June 1987.



As official duties go, this one gave Surbiton MP Ed Davey more pleasure than most; opening the 'phiz lab' in St Andrew's & St Mark's primary, Maple Road, where he is a governor. The junior school is one of the few in the UK with a dedicated

science teaching room. Funded by the Ogden Trust, it encourages handson experiments... literally. Saskia, 9, showed the MP how his tendons were connected, while laughter greeted the raspberry sounds he made by blowing down a straw in 'science busking'.

Teacher Matt Gates said the lab was good news at a time the UK needs scientists. It helped girls see the subject isn't just for boys, and it appealed to non-literary students. "Science relates to everything," he said. "Your mum may not wear a white lab coat... but she still uses science every day!"

Saskia's enthusiasm underlined how stimulating the zone can be. "I really enjoy science, so it s definitely something I'd think about," she said, asked if it might be her career choice.


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

Meet Jon and Claire McGrath, Surbiton's newest estate agents, who have launched the Winkworth branch at 26 Brighton Road with firm beliefs about the duty their role carries. "Estate agents have a responsibility to give back to the community," said Claire. "Surbiton is community-orientated, and I like to be involved."

For a decade, Claire, an Australian, was part of a large agency in Brisbane, with 1,000 properties under management, and 60 sales staff. Jon, who is English, also worked in sales Down Under.

When the pound dipped after Brexit, the time was right to move to London. But why Surbiton? "I had a few different options, but I love the village feel here, and it's right on the river," she said, adding how important the town's train connections are too.

She and Jon currently live in Epsom, because of their children's schools, but their affection for Surbiton runs deep.

"Everyone here's really nice, and everyone seems to get involved. There's always something quirky going on," said Claire.

A speaker and enthusiastic local guide, he is also publicity officer for the Kingston Archaeological Society, serves on the committee of the Classic Cinema Club, Ealing, and has appeared on TV with Michael Portillo in Great British Railways Journeys. For 30 years he worked as librarian at St Bernard's Hospital, Southall.

In the early 1980s he lived with his wife in Claremont Gardens, Surbiton, before the family moved to Chessington and then Ewell. The couple have twin daughters, Tasmin and Araminta. "It's a great honour to have been made chairman of the Surbiton & District Historical Society," he said.

Already Hollyfield pupils, parents and staff have donated 105 pairs of used trainers and football boots to a country where few children have access to organised sport.


The scheme began at Shrewsbury House School in 2016, with 900

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





She died on January 23, eight years after being diagnosed with blood cancer, and - as daughter Helen put it in her tribute - "having clung to life with every bit of strength she had".

Born in London on June 3 1932, the second of seven girls raised by Anna and Jack Sheehan, Pat spent her early years in Ireland before returning to England in 1942.

"She never did things by half measure," said Helen. "Everything she did, she made a success."

She met "the dashing John McCarthy", who survives her, in 1947 in Cheam. They married in June 1957. For the last 14 years, the couple have lived near the river in Grove Road.

Pat sang with Surbiton Oratorio under director John Wilkinson (it evolved into the Kingston Choral Society), and joined the Raeburn Singers. She was also an enthusiastic Italian speaker.

A mainstay of family life was Sunday lunches, "after which my parents would play piano and cello duets," said Helen.

The mass (aided by a thoughtfully designed large-print order of service) was conducted by Fr Michael Lovell of St Raphael's, and Fr Frank O'Connor, Pat's cousin from Limerick, who spoke of her "deep, profound faith". **Tim Harrison** • Anna Patricia McCarthy, born June 3 1932, died January 23 2018



At your service...

They're open... just as the tennis season gets properly under way. Restored, resurfaced and ready for play, the new-look courts at Alexandra rec are smooth and inviting... a major step up from their former pitted, crumbling state.

Overseen and managed by Surbiton Racket & Fitness Club, and backed by the Lawn Tennis Association, the four courts usher in a mini revolution in the way public tennis is delivered in the Royal borough.

For an annual fee of $\pounds 50$ (which covers an entire household), or by paying $\pounds 6$ an hour on a pay-and-play basis, courts are booked online, with entry gained via a door code.

The first serves whizzed over the nets at the Alexandra Drive courts two weeks ago.

A linked coaching programme will encourage newcomers, the aim being to broaden the appeal of tennis in Surbiton. Courts can be booked up to a fortnight in advance.

The community parks tennis programme is family-focused, with Surbiton Racket & Fitness Club also taking responsibility for major court improvements at Beverley Park and Kingston Road, New Malden.

Create your own Space to Grow but remember, be practical too, advises Janice Cripps **Low maintenance requires planning**

This year's Chelsea Flower Show (May 22-26) launches a category called Space to Grow, focusing on maximising space in typical town gardens, with plenty of ideas to take home. If you plan a visit and have visions of creating your own show garden, I take my hat off to you, but think about maintenance issues!

In the world of garden design, much time has been spent on 'the low maintenance garden'. It tops the list of time-poor clients, or ones who confess total ignorance of anything to do with horticulture. But are we talking lowmaintenance or zero-maintenance? Unless the garden is plant-free, it will need regular and dedicated attention.

By choosing the right plants, it is possible to reduce time spent working in the garden. But every plant has different characteristics and needs, and jobs need to be done at a specific time of the year; there's no getting away from it. Low-maintenance gardens need to be carefully planned

from the start. Here are some things to think about.
Use quality, long-lasting materials, particularly paving

 Ose quality, long lasting indeends, particularly paving or fencing. Porcelain paving is increasingly popular.
 Buy fewer plant varieties of plants, but get to know

them better. Get a head start by selecting those with the RHS award of garden merit, which means they are 'good doers' and won't need special care or attention.

Reduce or replace your lawn.

 Install good-quality garden edging such as Everedge, which means less time strimming borders.

Put in an efficient, automatic irrigation system – it can more cost-effective than watering by hand.

be more cost-effective than watering by hand.
 Plant more shrubs which offer year-round structure with a minimal maintananaa radima.

with a minimal maintenance regime.
Cover bare soil with perennials which don't need

staking. Weeds are opportunist; they quickly invade bare tracts of earth and can be a nightmare to get rid of.

 In mid-spring, lay a 2-4cm layer of mulch over bare soil to condition it, add nutrients, suppress weeds and conserve moisture, letting plants thrive. I use fine black manure; more attractive than wood chip or bark mulch. For more about Chelsea's Space to Grow gardens visit

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

It began with Lily Cove. "I was a young reporter on the Keighley News when I first heard about her story," said Sharon Wright, pictured.

It was a mystery from history; the 21-year-old balloonist had perished in 1906, plunging to her death in front of thousands at a gala after coming adrift from her parachute during a daredevil jump.

Lily's tragic death - never satisfactorily explained - periodically popped back into Sharon's mind. The Cleaveland Road playwright's Friller, a stage ghost story performed in Haworth, Yorkshire (the site of Lily's demise), proved, a century on, that the public could still be gripped by the exploits of the pioneering corsetted skydivers.

If theatregoers lapped up tales of women afflicted by 'balloon fever', as the press dubbed it, surely readers would too. Sharon did her research, and the result is Balloonomania Belles (Pen & Sword, £19.99, and available at Regency Books, Victoria Road).

Daredevil ascents (and descents) are described from an era 100 years before the aeroplane when reckless passion eclipsed health and safety, and when, as well as becoming celebrities and attracting vast crowds, female balloonists achieved an early liberation far beyond the norm of the day ... and notoriety to match.

"Lady aeronauts found a freedom in the sky that they didn't have on the ground," said Sharon, whose illustrated book draws on archives including Farnborough's aviation history collection.

Her tale extends to the salacious stories woven around airborne dames, and their rumoured exploits, out of sight in lofty wicker baskets. The volume is also being published in the United States.

Break a leg! Drama at play festival


